MG 284: Roger Walls Photograph Collection

Dates: ca. 1913

Extent: 18 16x21.5 cm glass negatives.

Biography: Roger Walls is a retired Saskatoon architect.

Scope and Content: These glass negatives – portraits and activities of a homesteading family – are believed to be from the Springwater area of Saskatchewan. They depict breaking the sod; threshing; and various images of family members, often posed standing out on the prairie. A few pictures are taken in or near the family home.

Custodial History: The negatives were given to Roger Walls by a family friend; Mr. Walls subsequently donated them to the University of Saskatchewan. The family friend also gave the Walls family the original photography equipment (since lost), suggesting the photographer (or heirs) had retained custody of both. Unfortunately, the name of the photographer is not known.
