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## Colonsay man hurt in collision

MOOSE JAW (Staff) — Victor Hughes, about 50, of Colonsay, received severe back injuries Sunday afternoon, when the car he was operating was in collision with a car driven by Ernest Boehmert of Regina.

The mishap occurred on the crest of a hill, on the north shore of Buffalo Pound Lake, about 20 miles north of here. Mr. Hughes was taken to hospital by Yates Ambulance.

RCMP are investigating the incident in which only \$150 damage was done to the vehicles.

## Moose Jaw building still lags

MOOSE JAW (Staff) — Construction in this city so far this year continues to lag behind the 1965 pace.

According to the engineer's department Friday, there were 45 building permits issued in August, valued at \$1,145,939. Compared with 63 in the same month last year, valued at \$1,155,084.

Last month's total brought the figures for the first eight months of the year to 273 permits, valued at \$3,670,736, compared with 334 permits, valued at \$4,094,644 issued in the same period last year.

Of August's total, nine permits were for new homes, worth \$111,427, compared with 19, valued at \$238,500, issued in August of 1965.

Since the beginning of the year, there have been 46 permits issued for new homes, valued at \$650,848, while in the period last year, there were 85 permits issued, valued at \$1,037,304.

A feeder sale will be held at the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool Livestock Yards here Oct. 6. It is expected about 3,000 head of cattle and calves will pass through the ring. # Green light given rink

MOOSE JAW (Staff) — Aldermen Monday night gave the green light for construction of the Pla-Mor Skating Rink in the South Hill district.

They authorized the commissioners to negotiate a satisfactory agreement with the Pla-Mor Booster Club to have a rink built by J. P. Lord Construction Co. Ltd. of Regina at a cost of \$69,800.

The decision follows negotiations by the city with the low bidder, after tenders submitted last week were considerably in excess of the estimated cost of \$65,000.

Lowest bid at that time was \$79,000, but this has now been pared by deleting certain items, including the mezzanine floor of the rink. It is also hoped to recover approximately \$9,800 under the winter works program.

## Moose Jaw retains laurels

MOOSE JAW (Staff) — The Moose Jaw Tennis Club Sunday retained the Thomson Cup, emblematic of women's inter-club supremacy, despite a strong bid by Saskatoon Riverside players.

It was the second successive day on which the local netters had hung on to the laurels, having turned back a challenge by Regina Civil Service Saturday.

In Sunday's play, Moose Jaw netters won two of the four singles matches, and were forced down to the wire in the deciding doubles match before winning out.

The singles victories went to Annie Thomson who defeated junior Martina Poole 7-5, 2-6, 6-2 and Gladys Morton who defeated Eva Newcombe 6-0, 6-3.

Saskatoon winners were Mary Paynter, with a 9-7, 6-1 victory over Shirley Smith and Junior Marg Kirkpatrick who defeated Ruth Shields 6-2, 5-7, 6-0.

In the clinching doubles match Morton and Smith downed Paynter and Madge Duncan by a 6-3, 2-6, 6-4 count.

## Bethune pioneer succumbs at 81

MOOSE JAW (Staff) — Funeral service for Mrs. Martha Rose, 81 of 1455 Hochelaga St. W., who died Monday, will be held at 2 p.m. Wednesday in the W. J. Jones and Son Chapel. Burial will be in Rosedale Cemetery.

Born in England, Mrs. Rose came to Canada in 1911, taking up residence in the Bethune district. She had resided in Moose Jaw since 1942.

Besides her husband, Albert, she is survived by two sons, John of Weyburn and Albert of Moose Jaw; five grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

The Pla-Mor Booster Club approached the city, several months ago, with the proposition that it donate \$20,000 in cash towards a new indoor rink for South Hill and obtain a \$40,000 loan with the city's backing, since the city will administer the rink.

Ald. Robert Livingston of the parks board said construction should be proceeded with as soon as possible, to ensure there would not be any further increase in the costs of materials or freight.

He said it was possible the rink facilities would be available towards the end of the winter season.

In the short half-hour session, before re-convening in works and finance sections, aldermen gave permission to the United Appeal to fly the campaign flag from the city hall flag-staff, place a street banner across Main St. N. and have flags placed on the curbs on Main St. N.

A letter from Jack Freiden, clothing store operator, protesting councils action in turning down a request for Monday closing of stores, was received and filed without comment.

Aldermen agreed with a recommendation of the Community Planning Commission to re-zone the area at the intersection of Grace St. and Ninth Ave. N.W. to permit construction of a \$50,000 service station on the southwest corner. Residents in the area will have the opportunity to protest such construction if they so desire and if necessary, the matter will be reviewed by council.

Mayor L. H. Lewry gave notice that, at the next regular meeting of council, he would move the city ask the Canadian Pacific Railway to start paying full city taxes on property, commencing Jan. 1, 1967.

A petition from residents of Marlborough St., from Chesnut Ave. to Willow Ave., for paving, was referred to the 1967 works program.
