

Dear Sister,

I thought that I would answer your letter this evening. am all O.K. and hope you are all the same. I and Uncle Ham have been cutting saw logs for the last few days. I am not going to stay at Uncle Ham's any longer but going to begin work for Arthur Reed in the morning for all summer and next fall. I am getting twenty-two dollars a monthaandffurnished a horse till I get one. Have you sold my horse yet? If not I want you to sell him right away for what you can get for him for I am going to buy one out here. I worked for Ray about a half of a day hulling clover and Mr. Pinkston a day and half and about half of the afternoon and then helped Mr. Wagoner the rest of that day and the next half a day in his place. That party that we had was for everybody that come. Aunt Fanny got me a nice brown necktie for Christmas. Well I guess I must close for this time for I am getting sleepy as I was setting up late last night entertaining the girls. So answer soon. From Emmet
