I have yours of the 6th enclosing copy of letter from Professor Waldron regarding some of your wheats. I am delighted to know that they have done so well under North Dakota conditions. I enclose herewith a statement indicating the results we have obtained from these wheats thus far.

I was very sorry that I missed you last summer, but was glad to know that you had found time to get away even for a very brief holiday. I will certainly make it a point to spend a little time with you this coming season and to give you every possible assistance I can.

If you have any special collections you would like further information on as regards yields, baking quality, etc., I would suggest that you have them grown at our Branch Farm at Scott in our regular plots at that place. All material from there as well as at our other Farms which is at all promising, is subjected to milling and baking test, so that your selections, or at least those which are particularly promising, would automatically come in for the same consideration as all the rest of our material.

You will be interested to know that we have one or two lines out of a crossing between your Early Triumph wheat and Reward which are doing particularly well at Scott. They are in rod row plots

now and will be tested for milling and baking quality  
this year. A couple are particularly promising.
